E-Bike Safety Reminders:

Types of E-Bikes

While most laws apply to both bicycles



and E-bikes, there are some laws specific to certain classes of E-bikes. Under Ohio law, there are three types of electric bicycles:

- Class 1 electric bicycle: A bicycle equipped with fully operable pedals and an electric motor of less than 750 watts that provides assistance only when the rider is pedaling and ceases to provide assistance when the bicycle reaches the speed of 20 miles per hour.
- Class 2 electric bicycle: A bicycle equipped with fully operable pedals and an electric motor of less than 750 watts that may provide assistance regardless of whether the rider is pedaling and is not capable of providing assistance when the bicycle reaches the speed of 20 miles per hour.
- Class 3 electric bicycle: A bicycle equipped with fully operable pedals and an electric motor of less than 750 watts that provides assistance only when the rider is pedaling and ceases to provide assistance when the bicycle reaches the speed of 28 miles per hour.

Where Can I Ride E-Bikes?

Under state law:

- E-bikes and low-speed micromobility devices may be operated on all public roadways, except on limited access highways and interstates.
- People are allowed to ride bicycles and E-bikes, **if the motor is not engaged, on the sidewalk**. However, local municipalities might adopt more restrictive rules for devices.

E-bikes should not be ridden on paths primarily designed for hiking, equestrian use, or mountain biking, or on any natural surface.

- Class 1 and 2 E-bikes are generally permitted on any bike lane, sidepath, or shared use path, although local laws may prohibit these classes of e-bikes on certain paths.
- Class 3 E-bikes are generally not permitted on shared use paths that aren't adjacent to a roadway.

For more information on where you can ride, check the laws for the area where you will be riding.

Age & Helmet Requirement

You must be at least 16 years of age to operate a class 3 e-bike or to rent a micromobility device. Anyone riding a Class 3 E-bike is required to wear a helmet, per Ohio law.

Winter is Coming....

Winter is almost upon us, so now is a good time to inspect your mailbox and the area around it in anticipation of plow season.

Painesville Township's Mailbox Guidelines for Snow Removal

Inspecting Your Mailbox

Property owners are encouraged to inspect their mailboxes and posts prior to the winter season each year and to replace or repair deteriorated mailboxes or posts to ensure their durability. Your mailbox should be designed and constructed to stand up to the rigors of the winter plowing season.

Design

Massive supports such as telephone poles, heavy metal posts, bricks, antique farm equipment or other similar items are considered hazards and should not be used. Any mailbox support should be designed so that if it is struck, it will bend, break or fall away from the striking vehicle to prevent severe damage to the vehicle or injury to the traveling public.

Repair or Replacement

The Painesville Township Service Department makes every effort to

protect the integrity of property owner's mailboxes. However, during periods of heavy snow accumulation, mailboxes are sometimes damaged as a result of winter plowing operations. On most occasions they are knocked down or damaged by the force of the snow coming off the plow.

Please note: Painesville Township will not replace non-standard, specialty or exotic type mailboxes, and will only use breakaway type posts (4" X 4" timber posts) and a standard U.S. Postal Service approved light weight steel mailbox. Reapplication of numbers and lettering is the homeowner's responsibility.

Reporting a Damaged Mailbox:

Since roadways within the township are maintained by many different agencies, please visit our website to see who is responsible for maintaining your road to ensure you are contacting the correct agency. To report damage done to your mailbox as a result of winter plowing operations by Painesville Township *please complete the Damaged Mailbox Form*. We will reach out to you ASAP.
